We had over 100 presentations to choose from to explore how we can be more effective in our literacy services for adult learners.

The significant theme of the conference is reflected in the poster shown above. There are 45,000,000 adults in the US who have literacy skills below third grade. **Two thirds of them are** 

women. There were several awards given to women who are now successful in many ways. They have amazing life stories!

As president of South Coast Literacy Council in South Orange County with 27 ESL centers serving 1,000 students), it was a true privilege to be a "learner" among so many who are about the work of improving literacy in the United States. Thank you, Alpha Delta Kappa.

Online applications become available approximately three months before the deadline. If you apply online, you need not do anything further.

#### NOEL LEONARD FUNDS AVAILABLE TO CONVENTION ATTENDEES

The generosity of Noel Leonard, state president from 1992-1994, provides \$100 in financial aid for first- timers at the **State Convention** in San Jose and \$100 for Council Presidents or her designee attending the **Regional Conference** in Honolulu, Hawaii, this summer.

Each council receives one first-timer grant. Chapters are to submit to their Council the name of one member who has not attended a state convention and who shows promise of leadership in the organization. The council will hold a random drawing to determine the recipient. The council presidents must notify the state president of their selections by April 1, 2020

Regional conference grants are for Council Presidents or a designee of a council to further their leadership skills. There is one grant for each council with recipients chosen by the Council President. The deadline for submitting the names to the state president for this award is June 1, 2020.

#### SALES AT STATE CONVENTION

Chapter altruistic sales may take place at the state convention. To reserve a place, chapters must submit the application available on the Home Page of the state website under State Convention to State Treasurer Marlene Cordova. List the items for sale and the name of the altruistic project that will benefit. The application must include a \$20 donation to the State Altruistic Project. Applications must be received no later than April 1, 2020. Space is limited and will be awarded on a first-come, first serve basis.

Chapter Presidents or their designees will line up outside the Sierra Ballroom at 8:45 AM on Saturday. Assistant Sergeants-At-Arms will give directions. 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Let me share a letter from Sherry Lynes, *Beta Rho*. Following the thirty-second State Convention in Santa Ana, Sherry Lynes sent the following letter to her chapter sisters. Sherry captured the spirit, the sisterhood and the spice of the convention. With her permission, I am including her letter in this newsletter. If you have not yet made up your mind to attend, perhaps her insight will **INSPIRE** you. Please read on.

The convention is over and I'm home now. For those of you who were not there, I wanted to take a few moments to reflect on what I had experienced, and to capture my ideas and thoughts in words before they flee from my brain.

The California State Convention of 2018 was an extremely well organized affair. Kudos to Chairperson Susan Raffo and helpers for all they did! President Diana Galvan modeled beautifully the protocols of convention, the presentations of resolutions, the ensuing discussions, and then led us through the voting process. She was precise, smooth, and articulate. I thought to myself, "Ah, that's how you do it," having been a chapter president and wondering if I was following correct protocols and procedures.

The attendance for the convention numbered 119; there were 84 voting delegates. There was wonderful entertainment by local high schools and community groups in the Cinco de Mayo theme. The meals and appetizers were delicious and kept us all going.

The installation of officers was fascinating and heartfelt as each officer handed over her position to the sister newly voted in. There were smiles, hugs, eyes moist with gratitude and appreciation for all that's been accomplished, and for that which is yet to be accomplished.

During the business session there was guided conversation about membership: its value, its strength, how to build it to be even stronger. Many ideas were offered (which will be shared with all California chapters as some point). They are amazing ideas, which were born out of the intellectual variety and large number of sisters present at this convention. I heard many say, "Oh, that's a great idea!," and saw members scribbling these ideas down on note pads or backs of fliers. It is good that we could all be together in one group discussion so astutely led by our leaders. Which brings me to the reason I am taking the time to write this reflection.

At dinner, as I relaxed and looked out over the sea of faces, I thought about the collective power of intellect and the deep histories of experience of all in that room. There were women with whom, I knew, I could connect at any time. They understand what it is to be an educator; they understand the ups and downs, the funny stories, the feelings I've had along the way. With these women, I don't have to explain myself because they get it – they understand my love for teaching, for connecting with the kids, for finding new ways to learn and to teach, and can share the palpable excitement of getting it right with a student. In this room there was love, reverence, a sense of honor, intelligence, and a history of a lot of hard work.

Throughout the weekend, as we reconnected with old acquaintances and connected with new, there was a feeling of acceptance, respect and appreciation that was unspoken. Most of all, there was a lot of love.

In the discussion about how to build membership, of the many great ideas I heard, the one that stuck with me was this: "What made me want to join  $A\Delta K$  is the relationships with other sisters." In my eyes, it's not just a passing acquaintance, it's sincere. It's rooted in all that we value as educators. Those relationships, this sisterhood, are pearls to have and to hold, and as was experienced in the beautiful Omega Ceremony on Sunday morning, to treasure forever.

We look now to new leadership in Karen Kirby, our new President. I know she will do a great job, and will inspire us to even greater heights. I hope you will afford yourself the opportunity in the future to attend a convention and a conference so you can experience the value of building relationships in Alpha Delta Kappa.

Ann Marie has been working with Kaleidoscope to make the transition as smooth as possible, but it will take time for everyone to become accustomed to the new procedures. Betty was a founding sister in California's first chapter - Alpha Chapter in Oakland in 1953. Betty loved Alpha Delta Kappa and is an ever-present *Inspiration* and role model for her California sisters.

Criteria for outstanding chapter include:

- Interesting and innovative programs.

- 3. Contributions to a scholarship program
- Representation and participation at all levels of Alpha Delta Kappa.
- 5. Consideration of pearls earned.

# Eleanor Bendell State Scholarship

This \$2,500 is given to a member of California Alpha Delta Kappa who is actively engaged in the field of education and is seeking professional growth. Professional growth is defined as enrollment in an advanced study program or engaged in creating or participating in a project that advances student/educator proficiency. Examples may include enrollment in an academic degree or certificate program in an accredited college or university, or creating curriculum that enriches and enables students to learn and teachers to teach.

The scholarship is open to any Alpha Delta Kappa member who has been in good standing for the previous biennium.

The guidelines, application form, and the evaluation rubric are on the California website in Awards/Grants/Scholarships.
